The trouble started By N1BBM when the log periodic antenna wouldn't load up as usual for the start of the ARRL DX contest. The feedline was checked from end-toend and seemed to be all right, but the impedance of the antenna had changed, and the search was on with binoculars to find what possible damage might have been done by the winter storms and winds. Funny though, it seemed to load on 80 meters. Although the problem was not easily spotted, the March winds helped find the culprit, a broken Lexan support insulator for the largest dipole element, and a cracked U-bolt that held the element in place. As if that wasn't bad enough, the timing with the winter weather caused some delays in getting to the rescue of the broken parts. W1IUX, and his assistants, N1BBM and K1DT were successful in removing the repeater antenna from atop the mast, loosening a guy, two main retainer bolts, and then using a winch to tilt the log so that the problem element could be assessed and the damaged parts repaired. An exciting video of the whole operation was taken by N1BBM, and the errant element provided some surprises, as it first tilted right, then left and then jumped up again to the right, as the boom was pulled from a horizontal to a vertical position. A dessert buffet followed the dinner, along with coffee and tea service. Our formal program started after the dinner was complete, with a welcome by Dave Smith, WA1UWU, the club president. He introduced our guests of honor, starting with David Sumner, K1ZZ, the Executive Vice President of the American Radio Relay League. Mr. Sumner gave his greetings, and proceeded to read an article from the archives of the ARRL, dating back to 1922 that mentioned the PRA. It seemed that there was a radio amateur, whose name got in the local RI press for a method that he had devised to eavesdrop on phone conversations, using some sort of an inductive antenna. The League officials were concerned about the bad name that this might engender for the hobby, and implored a member of the PRA to contact this errant ham and have him mend his ways. Next, Don Haney, KA1T, the Vice Director of the ARRL, New England Division was introduced, greetings gave his congratulations, and also those of Tom Frenaye, K1KI, the ARRL, New England Director, who was unable to be at the celebration. Don searched the QST back issues to deliver a few highlights of PRA notice and history. Rick Fairweather, K1KYI, the ARRL Section Manager of Rhode Island was next to give his salutations and fond memories of his visits to the PRA at Beavertail on Field Day. The three League officials then presented our president with a large framed certificate, commemorating our 75 years of affiliation with the ARRL. "It is the Clubs," said David Sumner, "that make up the essence of the American Radio League." And the Providence Radio Association is one fine example. Each of

the officials was presented with a deluxe Quill pen desk set with a gold base and PRA logo set in the center, as a momenta of the club and this event.

Concerns have been raised about the access to the connector straps from the feed to the element, and the ability to be able to silver solder them after the mechanical repairs have been made, but it appears that there are always solutions for these vexing problems.

While the element mount is being repaired, additional parts will be replaced to insure the long and stable life of the antenna. The feedline connector reducers will be reworked to make the weatherproofing even more resistant to moisture.

Chris Rao, N1XZY, our newest club member installed a new 486 motherboard in the PC, along with another 8 meg of RAM. This may help speed operations along, and make multitasking a bit easier. The computer still needs to be RFI-proof.

The ATV repeater project is at a bit of a standstill, after the installation of a 'scope in the rack. Pictures were received from the club to the indoor setup at the Airport Radisson at the Anniversary Banquet.

Priday, March 21, 1997


